Designing for the Future

Throughout our nearly 160-year history, Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota (LSS) has been a leader in finding new and effective ways to address evolving community needs. LSS' commitment to delivering quality, person-centered services with an entrepreneurial spirit has fueled its growth and longevity.

The newly launched LSS Design Lab, a key initiative of the Empower What's Possible campaign, represents an exciting advancement in LSS' ongoing pursuit of strategic growth and innovation. As part of LSS' business development team, the Design Lab will create a structured process to collect, evaluate and act on insights from our most important mission partners: the neighbors we serve.

"A core function of the Design Lab is deep community listening and engagement," shared Tika Khachatryan, Design Lab manager. "We want to hear from the people we serve so we can evolve our services to better meet their needs, understand their priorities and support them in achieving their goals."

The Design Lab launched its first official project earlier this year in conjunction with another Empower What's Possible campaign initiative: the Center for Changing Lives (CFCL) Frogtown-Rondo in Saint Paul. The team conducted in-depth interviews with several youth and families currently supported by LSS. Those insights are informing the design of the transitional housing services and apartments that will occupy the second floor of LSS' newest CFCL.

"The people we serve are our best experts, providing us with a deeper understanding of what they are looking for from us in terms of the new physical space as well as the overall experience they desire," shared Tika. "Those types of insights are invaluable and can't always be seen through data alone."

Formalized community engagement will be a foundational element of all projects led by the LSS Design Lab. Feedback shared by individuals utilizing LSS services will become the springboard for further ideation among stakeholders, including LSS employees, community partners and funders. Those ideas will drive enhancements and new service offerings that can be scaled statewide and lead to better outcomes.

Russ and Jan Michaletz have been investing in Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota (LSS) for nearly 30 years. "We like to think of ourselves as investors rather than donors," shared Jan. "It feels like it highlights the courage of those LSS serves and the work they put in to changing their lives." "It also frames the way we think about giving," added Russ. "We want our contributions to do the most good possible."

The Michaletzes' initial connection to LSS came through Jan. After years of serving as the chair of the Alumni Board of Directors at Gustavus Adolphus College, Jan accepted a role on the LSS Foundation Board of Trustees. Reflecting on the decision, Jan said, "I was attracted to LSS because of its legacy of getting things done. It's not been an organization that spins its wheels. LSS has a rich heritage of figuring out ways to meet needs in communities."

"There is a tremendous momentum in the LSS movement," added Russ.
"After Jan's time on the Foundation Board, I was approached, and I said yes because of LSS' commitment to strategic innovation. That's the sort of thing that gets me excited."

After nine years of service, Russ concluded his term on the LSS Foundation Board of Trustees in 2023, prepared to step into a new role with LSS as Chair of the Empower What's Possible campaign steering committee. He has played an important role in setting the vision for LSS' ambitious \$95 million comprehensive campaign, part of which will focus on strategically elevating LSS' commitment to new service design and innovation through the LSS Design Lab.

The Michaletzes see a bright future for the social service sector in Minnesota. LSS' long-standing reputation as a trusted leader as well as its ongoing commitment to innovation through strategic initiatives like the Design Lab will contribute to ongoing successes. "LSS has proved, again and again, that it is a trustworthy organization," reflected Russ. "The LSS Design Lab will be the point of the arrow for fresh innovation and continued leadership."
